## Labor Department Releases State, Borough and Place 2012 Population Estimates

JUNEAU, Alaska—Alaska's population increased by 3.1 percent – or 22,067 people – from April 2010 to July 2012, based on population estimates released today by the Alaska Department of Labor and Workforce Development. Alaska's growth outpaced the United States as a whole, which grew 1.7 percent over the same period.

Of Alaska's 29 boroughs and census areas, 26 grew between 2010 and 2012. The largest population increases were in the Municipality of Anchorage (7,016), Matanuska-Susitna Borough (4,806), Fairbanks North Star Borough (2,762), City and Borough of Juneau (1,557) and Kenai Peninsula Borough (1,356).

Among the state's six economic regions, Anchorage/Mat-Su gained the most over the period (11,822) followed by Interior (3,090), Southeast (2,759), Gulf Coast (2,122), Southwest (1,407) and Northern (867).

A mix of natural increase – births minus deaths – and migration led to the population gains in Anchorage/Mat-Su, Gulf Coast and Southeast. Natural increase accounted for most of the growth in the Interior, Northern and Southwest regions.
