months, there are two upcoming Safety Stand-Down events; The National Stand-Down to Prevent Struck-by Incidents in conjunction with National Work Zone Awareness Week, April 15-19,

2024. The National Safety Stand-Down to Prevent Falls in Construction will also be held May 6-10, 2024.

Struck-by incidents, according to research from CPWR, are the second leading cause of death among construction workers, and the leading cause of nonfatal injuries. Whether it is falling objects, being struck by vehicles,



swinging objects during material handling, or being struck by rolling objects, they are a major hazard that need to be addressed. CPWR Struck-By Hazards


CHASE Spotlight



To provide some relevant data and trends to everyone, hazards identified by AKOSH Consultants during visits are being compiled as visit reports are reviewed and completed. Some of the data and statistics are as follows:

2024 1st Quarter

Total Hazards Identified: 47 Serious Hazards: 11 Other Than Serious Hazards: 32 Regulatory Hazards: 4 The five areas of most concern, based on identified hazards are: Subparts Hazard Communication, Electrical, Stairways and Ladders, Occupational Health and Environmental Controls, and Fall Protection.



Many hazard communication issues revolve around not having Safety Data Sheets on hand or not being readily accessible. Another concern is not having suitable facilities for quick drenching and flushing of the eyes where corrosive materials are present. Check SDSs Section 4 for first aid measures; even some substances that are not listed as corrosive will require flushing eyes for 15 minutes, such as Oatey ABS Medium Black Cement.

Electrical hazards predominantly deal with missing ground prongs on plugs, flexible cords not being protected from damage, and misuse of splitters which should be plugged directly into outlets and not used in conjunction with other splitters.

Stairway and Ladder deficiencies noted have largely been associated with missing load ratings on ladders, stairways having four or more risers, or rising more than 30 inches missing a handrail, or landings having unprotected edges.

Occupational Health and Environmental control hazards relate to instances of first aid supplies having expired, first aid kits not having been inspected weekly [1926.50(d)(2)] on construction sites, and sanitation discrepancies where eating and drinking areas are exposed to toxic materials, as well as cross contamination conditions being present where food and drink containers are in the workplace.

Fall protection concerns continue to be missing guardrails at appropriate heights; window apertures on upper floors before windows are installed, wall openings, on stair landings that are unguarded at 6' or higher.
